BODY OF KAHLIL GIBRAN STARTS BACK TO SYRIA

Poet, Artist and Philosopher Died in April-Countrymen Eulogize Him as Liner Sails.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., July 24 (AP). The body of Kahill Gibran, Syrian poet, artist and philosopher, who died in New York last April, was today taken back to Syria aboard the Fabre liner Sinaia. It was accompanied on its journey by Miss Mariana Gibran of Boston, the poet's sister, and Mr. and Mrs. Asaf George, also of Boston.

Gibran will be buried in his native town of Bechare in Lebanon, where a national shrine containing his manuscripts and paintings will be erected.

Before the coffin was placed on board the ship services were held at the pier in the presence of more than 200 Lebanese from New York, Boston, Providence and Fall River. Gibran was eulogized in English and Arabic by a number of speakers and a wreath from the 700 Lebanese living in Providence was placed at the base of the casket.

The speakers at the services were the Rev. Philip J. Nagem of Providence, Mgr. Stephen S. El Douahiy of Boston, the Rev. M. Stephen of Brooklyn, the Rev. Joseph Eid of Fall River, Elias F.
